JUNE 2012

Are you day dreaming about your garden and all of the fresh, delicious produce you'll have in a few months? When you're planting your garden please consider dedicating a row or two for vegetables to be donated to the Thompson Senior Center. Even if you have a little extra that you're afraid will go to waste, we can use it. By sharing your harvest, you help provide Chef Ryan with fresh, seasonal, local produce for our daily luncheon and Meals on Wheels Programs. Your donation helps to provide good nutrition to our patrons and helps with the food budget. The Thompson serves over 20,000 delicious, nutritious meals each year so every bit helps!



SHARE THE HARVEST 2011 RESULTS

Over 31 gardeners contributed healthy, local produce to our daily meals programs over a 5 month period last year. Donations began in early June with carrots and beets from a 2010 root cellar followed by fiddle-heads, asparagus and multiple donations of rhubarb and lettuce by early July. Turnips, beets and carrots were the next treats to arrive. Bush beans began in August and by the end of the month many donations of

zucchini and cucumbers began and continued well into the fall. Tomatoes were late (poor growing season) and not as abundant as previous years. Pole beans, bush beans and lettuce were made available from August to November. Our harvest season finished off with fall contributions of celery, basil, apples, winter squash and brussel sprouts. The produce donated was included in at least 100 of the daily menus for a period of five months. THANK YOU to each of our 2011 Share the Harvest Contributors!



OUR NATIONS RAILROADS, THEN AND NOW

Presented by Author and Railroad Historian, State Representative Charles Bohi Tuesday, June 19, 1:00PM

It is hard to overstate the impact railroads had on our history. In just over 40 years they transformed a nation limited by very slow transportation into a na-



tional market and economy. From about 1860 to 1930 railroads were, by far, the dominant means of overland transportation in the United States and Canada. Mr. Bohi will discuss how excessive regulation, uncooperative unions, and inept management nearly destroyed the railroad industry after World War II. However, the end of regulation, more cooperative labor relations, and much better management have made it possible for railroads to come roaring back and play a significant role in our society and economy today.



Name That First Lady Trivia Game Tuesday, July 17, 1 PM



In a question and answer format, we will explore nearly four dozen First Ladies whose lives turn out to be unexpectedly fascinating, often moving, and occasionally outrageous.

MARY TODD LINCOLN TALK, by C.J. King Tuesday, August 7, 1 PM

C.J. King became interested in the Lincoln women when she learned she was related to them through the Harlan family. She wrote her master's thesis on the subject and then expanded on the material to write her book, *Four Marys and a Jessie: The Story of the Lincoln Women*. Dr. Harold Holzer, the author or editor of 23 books about Abraham Lincoln, wrote the book's introduction. He observed, "The Lincoln women have been woefully ignored by most historians, and deserve their day in the sun. At long last C.J. King has filled in many blanks with a history of the Lincoln—and Todd—and Harlan women across two centuries. C.J. King is a professional writer and editor for more than 30 years.
