Our October book is He Wanted the Moon subtitled "The Madness and Medical Genius of Dr. Perry Baird, and His Daughter's Quest to Know Him" by Woodstock author Mimi Baird. When Mimi was 6 years old, her father disappeared from her life with no explanation for his daughter. When she turned 56, a package arrived on her doorstep that contained her father's diary of his mental illness. As a brilliant doctor, he documented his bipolar disorder in hopes of helping the scientific community help those who suffered as he did. His research even led him to the medicine that helps bipolars today, but the medical community was not ready to hear it. Since publication of the book, Mimi has traveled to many universities and hospitals to
